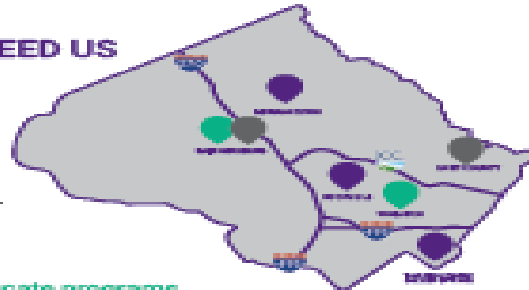

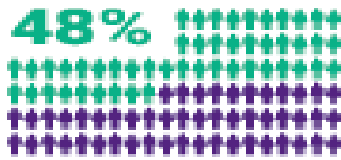

Our Board Policy

- MC's Participatory Governance functions based on board policy established in 2010.
- The board has primary responsibility for governing MC and has authorized the President to develop procedures to implement the policy.
- “Effective governance is achieved in the spirit of **cooperation, collaboration, civility, respect, and collegiality** and involves all levels of the college including students.”

MC Participatory Governance

“Participatory governance:

- ✓ is a method of ***decision-making***...policies, procedures, and practices are **recommended**...to the president and the Board
- ✓ promotes **open and honest communication** among and between the constituencies that make up the College community.
- ✓ ***seeks to maximize agreement among constituencies*** and it provides mechanisms to assess its effectiveness.”

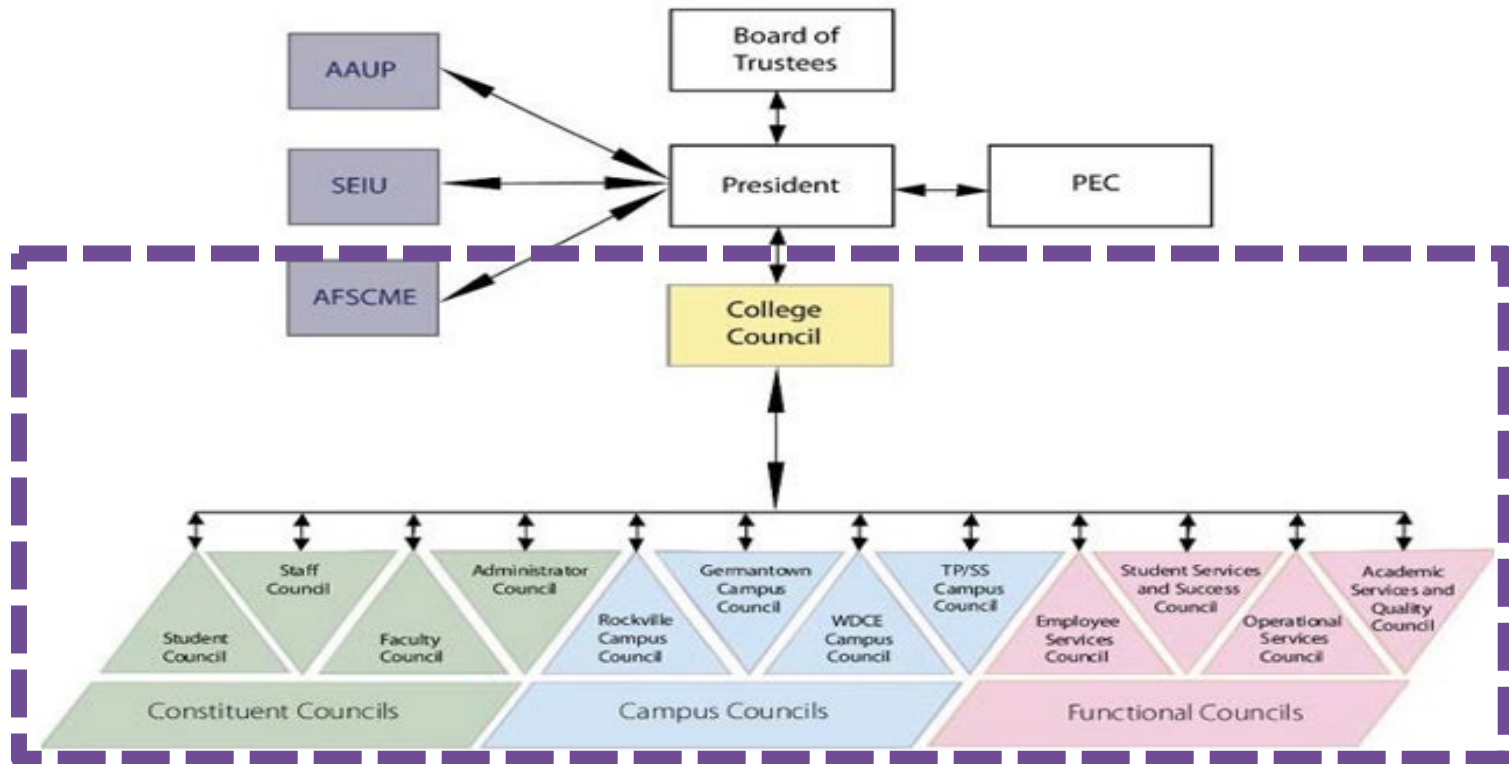

COLLEGE COUNCIL

- Each council has a council chair
- Consists of 12 council leaders
- 1 College Council Chair (13th members)
- Each Council has a chair, vice chair, and secretary

- *3 Types of Councils = 12 Councils +1 College Council*

Participatory Governance Guidelines

- The constitution, handbook, and by-laws provide for the council membership and governance procedures.
- Each council has a chair, vice chair and a secretary.
- Most council members are elected to a two-year team.
 - Students are elected for a one-year term.
- Councils are populated with all positions of the College.
- Persons can self-nominate or be nominated by others.

Governance Role

▪ DO

- Governance councils make recommendations, provide feedback, disseminate information, and offer input.

▪ DO NOT

- Governance councils do not implement or manage college work.
- College procedures that involve contractual, governmental or legal requirements are approved and executed by the President with oversight by the Board of Trustees.
- Examples include: Collective Bargaining, Legal Rights, Federal and State Mandates.

Member Expectations

- ***Participate*** in the Council
- ***Communicate*** with Constituents
- ***Represent*** Constituents
- ***Complete*** the Training
- ***Provide feedback*** on Governance

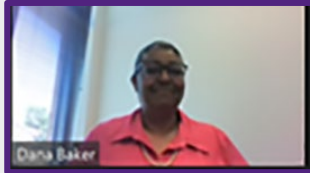
Faculty Council 2021-2022

 - Conversation with Constituency Councils
- ***With the President***
 - Attends College Council Meetings
 - Invited to attend various council meetings
- ***With Senior Leadership***
 - Each senior leader serves as liaison to various council
 - Governance representation invited to leadership meetings

Pathways to a Recommendation

- How do/can constituents use governance?
- An issue needs attention (constituent concern)
- I (we) have a great idea (advocate for a solution)
- How can College leaders utilize governance participation to support decision-making?
- Do you want to inform or engage stakeholders?
- If you want to engage, what level of participation are you willing to accept?



Concerns to Recommendations

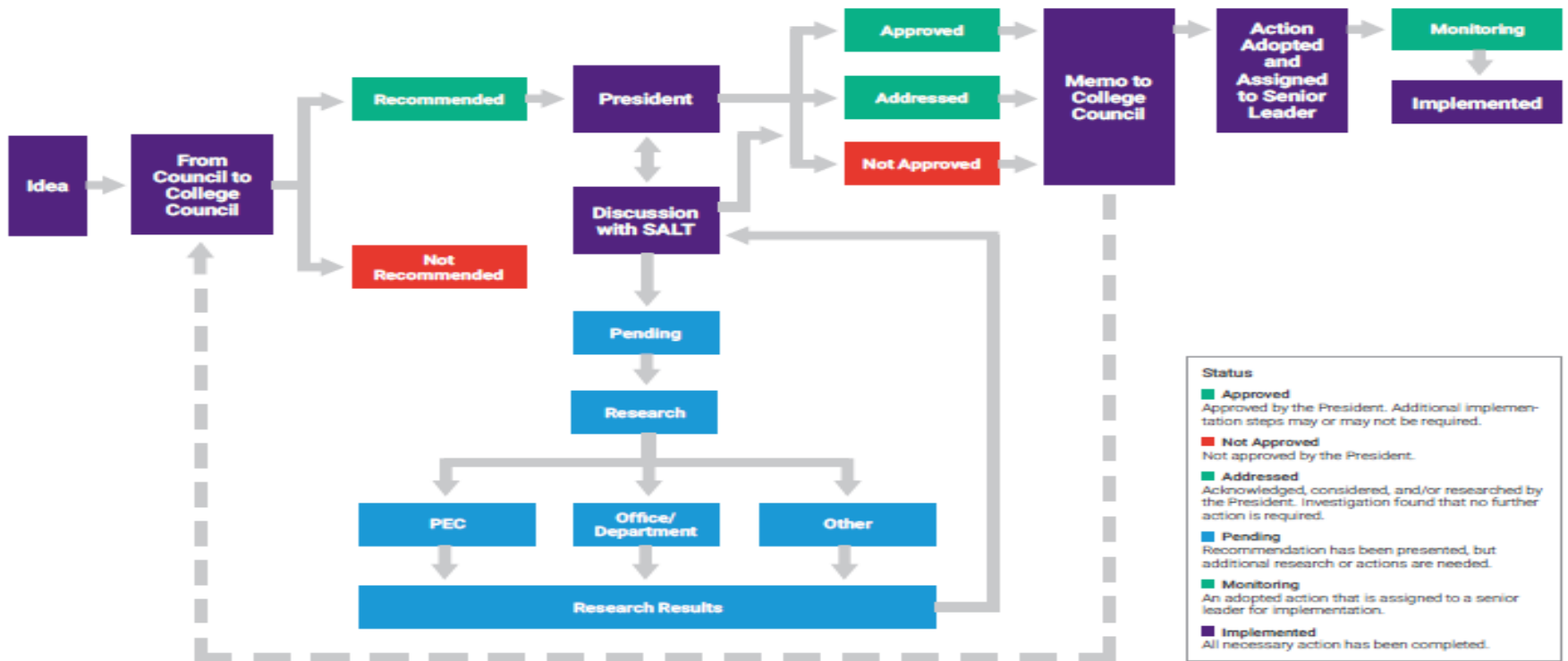
CONSTITUENCY CONCERNS

1. Concern presented to Council
2. Council addresses concern
3. Concern is tracked annually
4. Concern is resolved
5. Information/Referral provided or Concern develops into formal recommendation

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Approved by individual council
2. Approved by College Council
3. Presented to the President
4. Decision Made
5. Decision is monitored and tracked until implementation is complete

Governance Recommendations Workflow



Recommendation Results

Governance Constitutional change to increase PT Faculty to 2 positions on each Functional Councils.

Increase the MC Shuttle ridership capacity.

Provide feminine hygiene products available on all MC campuses.

Extend MC library hours during finals week.

Waive application fees for non-credit students moving to credit courses.

Update College telework processes.

Provide free flu vaccines available to students on all campuses.

Review of Assessment Center

Provide Tuition Benefit Wavier for Dependent Children

Student Recordings and Required Use of Cameras and Microphones
